A Look Back on a Whirlwind Year and Look Forward to a New Year



Wow! Spring has sure been a "whirlwind" this year. District conventions were a delight for this director when I met many members as I dashed around the state. Then as we gathered for State Convention in Rock Island, we saw rushing, rising rivers whirling their excess waters. We've gone back and forth from furnaces to air conditioning as the weather changes in extremes each week. Most recently, we share our concern and sympathy with those affected by historic tornadoes that ripped through the south and Joplin, MO. As usual, GFWC Clubwomen are anxious to help those in need. You may contribute to the GFWC efforts by sending checks to GFWC, Attn: Spring 2011 Storms Disaster Relief, 1734 N Street NW, Washington, DC 20036-2990. Our thoughts and prayers remain with the families and communities that have been affected by these storms.

The magnificent work and concern for others of club women throughout Illinois was evident as we gathered for convention to recognize those outstanding clubs who report. Recognition is a big part of convention, but additionally, I like to refer to it as a big family reunion, renewing friendships and sharing the news of our families and communities. If you didn't get to be part of it, do you know if your club got awards? More importantly, did you report? To see if your Junior club received recognition, you can simply go to www.gwfciljuniors.org, visit the Members Only tab and go to the Downloads to view the "Beary Brightest" club projects in the 2001 Convention Awards. If your club didn't report, it's not too soon to start planning for the 2011 reports. A little planning now makes it an easy process next January. We know that every club has outstanding projects and ideas that other communities could benefit from.

GFWC is a two-way street. Club members see a need in their community and take action. They share their successes with their districts, the districts share with other state members and the state reports are shared with GFWC. When GFWC sees a project that is outstanding, they share it with clubwomen from around the country, coming back to the grassroots clubs. Before you know it an entire movement can sweep the country, much the way GFWC members started the movement to put yellow lines in the center of roads.

The most recent movement I have taken under my wing is the effort to have **color-coded emergency pediatric bags** in every ambulance in Illinois. GFWC Wisconsin started this project several years ago. Via that two-way street, the Illinois Juniors learned of this project at GFWC meetings and are bringing this project to the Illinois clubs. I am happy to announce that through working with a manufacturer, we have been able to design a bag that will meet the needs of emergency personnel, and will only cost approximately \$150. We are waiting for the second prototype to be completed for final approval and will be distributing information on purchasing these bags for your community, during the summer region meetings. Although this project has taken three years to make it one that most clubs can afford, it has been worth the wait. The price for the original bag that we saw was \$800. Perseverance has paid off, and I encourage all clubs to look into this project.

Speaking of Region Meetings, I encourage all members to take the opportunity to attend. Meetings such as this are just one of the benefits of belonging to a GFWC club. You will learn from them and can take the information back to your clubs on that same street you take to get to the meeting.

It takes "u" to make GFWC succeed. That is what makes you a "Loveable, Huggable Volunteer".

PIERCE'S PARLIAMENTARY POINTERS ORDER IN THE COURT

Parliamentary procedure is intended to facilitate progress in meetings; enable the assembly to make wise collective decisions within a reasonable time; uphold the principles of fairness, equality and common sense; and protect fundamental rights.

Such rights include:

the right of the majority to rule;

the right of the minority to be heard;

the right of the assembly to civil and orderly deliberations;

and the rights of individuals, absentees, and the organization as a whole to be protected from abuse.

How close do you have **ORDER IN THE COURT** in your club?


Consider this thought-provoking acronym...MAD:

M stands for Monarchy (under this regime, the presiding officer makes the decisions.)

A stands for Anarchy (under this regime, a vocal minority dictates and imitates others.)

D stands for Democracy (under this regime, the members collectively make the decisions.)

Strive for **ORDER IN THE COURT**, strive for a democracy within your club meeting where the members collectively make the decisions.

"LIFE" Leadership Tips to Start a New Club Year

- Start club year with a leadership workshop including GFWC history, structure, accomplishments, and other pertinent information.
- Have club members break into groups and design an ideal fundraising project for your club year. Share and select the most popular.
- Break your membership into teams and challenge each team to come up with a solution to a particularly sticky club problem, i.e., obtaining officers, attendances, etc.
- Plan a brainstorming session with your club and\or board to investigate your club's priorities and goals for a year and\or for five years.
- When the club administration changes have a meeting of the old and new board so projects continue harmoniously and ideas can be exchanged.
- HAVE FUN at all meetings and events! PLAN it that way! This is good leadership!!

Thursday, July 14, 2011, 9:00 am, Region Meeting, Tour of Cedarhurst Museum

Nestled on a 90-acre site in southern Illinois, Cedarhurst celebrates the arts year-round with exciting visual and performing arts programs for the public. Explore rolling meadows and woods, home to Cedarhurst Sculpture Park, the museum's outdoor gallery with over 60 large-scale sculptures. Visit the Mitchell Museum with contemporary art exhibitions in two galleries, including the Children's Gallery. Enjoy works by Mary Cassatt, Maurice Prendergast, Childe Hassam and more, part of the museum's American painting collection acquired by founders John R. and Eleanor R. Mitchell.

Shelli Fehr Central Illinois Region Vice President

Friday, July 15, 2011, 9:00 am, Region Meeting, Tour of Abraham Lincoln's Home

Beautifully restored to its 1860 appearance, the Greek Revival house was Abraham and Mary Lincoln's home for 17 years. In 1844 they bought it for \$1,200 and some land from the Rev. Charles Dresser, who performed their marriage ceremony in 1842. Three of the four Lincoln sons were born here, and one (Edward) died here in 1850 at nearly four years of age. When Lincoln won the 1860 Republican Presidential nomination, he received a delegation of party officials in his parlor. When Lincoln became a presidential candidate the house became a magnet for visitors, parades, rallies and other political festivities. After holding farewell receptions there in 1861, the Lincolns rented it, sold most of their furniture, and entrusted the family dog to a neighbor.

Diane Addante Northern Illinois Region Vice President

Saturday, July16, 2011, 9:00 am, Region Meeting, Tour of Hines VA Hospital Fisher House

Edward Hines Jr. VA Hospital is located 12 miles west of Chicago and sits on a 147 acre campus. The hospital specializes in spinal cord injury, neurosurgery, radiation therapy, and cardiovascular surgery. Lt. Edward Hines Jr. died while serving in France during WWI. His family (the Hines Lumber Company) donated the property to the government and the hospital was named in his memory.

The Fisher House is a \$6.2 million, two-story comfort home provides free temporary housing for families of wounded service members and other military or veteran patients receiving medical treatment at Hines VA hospital. The house consists of 20 suites and has been open for over a month. The house features common living and dining rooms areas and top-of-the-line kitchens. Gov. Pat Quinn and Tammy Duckworth helped cut ribbon officially dedicating the 44th Fisher House in the country. There is at least one Fisher House at every major military medical center to assist families in need and to ensure that they are provided with the comforts of home in a supportive environment.

Is anyone, or your Club a **FRIEND of WHRC**? Have you informed Club members what is the scope and purpose of WHRC? Do you have a Club WHRC Chairman? Report all these on the WHRC report. Native American Indians by Lou Brown



The GFWC Illinois Federation will again work with the American Indian Center in Chicago. Over 32,000 Native Americans live in the Chicago area. The center is located at 1530 West Wilson Ave, Chicago, IL 60640. Clubs are encouraged to support the center through donations: Clothing of all sizes, school supplies, and items of food for their pantry.

For monetary donations, passing a basket at each meeting can be an easy way and a great way to help the Native Americans. All monetary donations for the American Indian Center and monetary donations for Native American Scholarships should be sent to your District Treasurer. All non-monetary donations can be given directly to the American Indian Center in Chicago. Clubs reported 148 programs/projects, 1,831 volunteer hours, \$4,664.00 donated money, and \$22,684 in-kind donations. Arissa St. Germaine received the Native American Scholarship.

Some ideas that clubs reported: members attended Pow Wow's, programs on Native Americans were presented at club meetings, Native American Prayers were presented at club meetings, and donations of ink cartridges, school supplies, baby showers, used and new clothing, tray favors for holidays, and Christmas gifts for the children were donated to the Center.




