### GLR President's Special Emphasis—Autism Awareness



he Autism Society has been working for those affected by autism since 1965, and at every level and in every aspect of their organization, they keep the integrity of the individual with autism at the center of all they do. Autism Society embraces an overall philosophy that chooses to empower individu-

als with autism and their parents or caregivers to make choices best suited to the needs of the person with autism.

The Autism Society believes that each person with autism is a unique individual; they and their family should have the right to learn about and then select the options that they feel are most appropriate for them. To the maximum extent possible, they believe that the decisions should be made by the individual with autism in collaboration with family, guardians and caregivers. Providing information and education to help in an informed decision is more highly regarded at the Autism Society than advocating for one particular theory or philosophy.

Building inclusive communities that are welcoming for individuals with autism is the Autism Society's vision for all affected by autism. To that end, the national office of Autism Society has continued to partner with AMC Theatres to create monthly Sensory Friendly Film events as well as an employment outreach

program for hiring those with Autism Spectrum Disorders. Since 2005, the Autism Society has implemented the Sale and Sound TM program. This on-going program provides training to first responders throughout the nation along with much-needed resources on topics such as general safety, emergency preparedness and prevention, and risk management

Currently, to widen their outreach of the under-served communities impacted by autism, they are working on a faith initiative to empower religious organizations to be inclusive of individuals with autism at their services. While the national office spearheads these efforts, local affiliates collaborate at local levels with added publicity which permits for the success of these endeavors.

The Autism Society founded National Autism Week and introduced the Autism Awareness Puzzle Ribbon to signify the diversity of autism and hope for the future. April is recognized as Autism Awareness Month.

Page Harrington, Executive Director of the National Women's Party (NWP), will speak about the illustrious history of the organization, and its current endeavors to educate the public on the women's rights movement. Founded in 1917, the National Women's Party was host to women wanting to advocate for suffrage. The NWP engaged Congress and the country through the organization with nonviolent protests, such as marches, pickets, speaking tours, and hunger strikes. Their determination and grit captured the attention of the nation and garnered public support for the women's suffrage movement. After the passage of the 19th amendment in 1920, Alice Paul, founder of the NWP, knew their work was just beginning. In

1923, Paul wrote the Equal Rights Amendment, which the NWP advocated for throughout the remainder of the 20th century.

### Legislation / Resolutions Committee Highlights

s GFWC Legislation/Public Policy chairman, I also serve on the GFWC Resolutions Committee. The committee meets at each board of directors meeting and once a year at GFWC Head-GFWC International President's assistants provide delicious meals, each with a differ-

Each resolution is reviewed every 4 years. At the first board of directors meeting, the resolutions chairman assigns each committee member with specific resolutions to

review. The committee members check to make sure the resolution is still relevant and has not been completed. If not, they determine if the resolution is up-to-date and decide if changes should be made to the resolution.

The committee as a whole looks at each resolution. Every resolution up for review is read and discussed. Many resolutions are reviewed with no change. The resolutions to be updated or expanded are discussed, information pertinent to the

tions, to make them stronger.

Each afternoon that the committee meets, they present for recommendation to present at GFWC Convention, mailing list. Once the amended, rescinded or proposed new resolutions have been approved by the Executive Committee, they are prepared for the Call to the GFWC Annual Convention.

Resolutions may be presented only by the following: the



Executive Committee, the Resolutions Committee, a State Federation by convention action, or a Service Community Program Chairman, a Standing or Special Committee chairman (these chairmen can review current resolutions and/or initiate new ones, in accordance with their programs of work). Or an International Club, paying per capita dues, may pre-

sent resolutions to the International Liaisons Chairman for consideration by the Resolutions Committee.

### **GFWC Candidacy Requirements**

o, you are thinking about running for a GFWC office, or you have already made up your mind to do so. Now

First of all let me congratulate you on your decision to seek a GFWC office. I know this

has not been an easy decision for most. But now you need to make sure you follow all the rules set down in the GFWC Bylaws and Standing Rules.

By now each GFWC State President has received a letter from the GFWC Elections Committee Chairman, Susan B. Martin. This very important letter includes the three steps involved in the process:

- 1. Determining a candidate's eligibility for
- 2. Endorsing a candidate for office, and
- 3. Submitting the required documentation to GFWC via the GFWC Elections Committee Chairman postmarked no later than October 1, 2017.\*

\*(**Please Note:** The Bylaws currently read October 1, 2017. The Bylaws Committee is proposing an amendment to change the date to **August 1, 2017**, as per Standing Rules 9.b, at the 2017 Annual Convention to Please know we wish you all become effective at the close of the GFWC the best! Convention.)

Every candidate and State President should carefully read the following Bylaws: Article VI, Officers, Section 6.2 Eligibility; Article VII, Nominations and Elections, Section 7,1, Nominations, Section 7.2 Endorsements, Section 7.3 Nominations from the Floor, and Section 7.4 Elections.

They also need to review the GFWC Standing Rules #8 Candidates for Office and #9 Rules Governing Elections.



Also please remember that no candidate may announce via social media her intention to run for GFWC office or the fact that she has received an endorsement from her state prior to the close of the GFWC Fall Board

Meeting in the odd-numbered year. Social media includes Facebook, Twitter, or Instagram, and similar public or semi-public forms of communication.


# **GLR Luncheon June 25**
