THE KEYS TO BEING PRESIDENT . . .

What do I do as President of GFWC Illinois? A lot!

The President has general supervision of the work of GFWC Illinois and directs the activities at Headquarters. It's great to work with Deana on your behalf.

Additionally, I am the liaison between GFWC and the GFWC Illinois Board of Directors. The President attends GFWC Board Meetings twice a year and receives numerous communications from GFWC which it is my responsibility to share with GFWC Illinois via the Executive Committee and Board. I am the chairman of the GFWC Illinois delegation at GFWC Convention. As President Elect, I attended Incoming Leadership Training and an Orientation in preparation for the office.

I also serve on the Great Lakes Region Board of Directors.

One of my favorite duties is presiding at GFWC Illinois Executive Committee and Board Meetings. At present, there are two per year outside of Convention and both bodies meet at Convention. These meetings require selecting sites that can accommodate our group, including hotel reservations as needed. Meal selections are also necessary. Agendas are prepared and Calls are sent to invite members to the meetings. I attend any special meetings of the board, such as Strategic Planning. Additionally, the President is ex officio member of all committees and attends their meetings as well.

In the first year of the administration, the President organizes the Board Orientation for the new Board.

The President is very involved in the preparation and proofing of the State Yearbook. She also assists with proofing the Reporting Packet as needed.

I have elected to prepare monthly President's letters and also direct other communication, including additions to the website, as needed.

A privilege that comes with the office is appointing the Convention Committee, Historian, Parliamentarian, Special Committee Chairmen and members to the Strategic Planning Committee, one from each region.

All contracts for GFWC Illinois activities are reviewed and signed by the President. She is also co-signer on checks and investment account activity.

The President plans and supervises each Convention during her term of office. Easily the most time consuming and stressful aspect of the job. Also, the most rewarding.

Another favorite duty is attending District and Club meetings and functions. It's great to connect with clubwomen across the state! Generally, most Districts have their annual meetings in the spring, which makes that a very busy time. It's nearly impossible for one person to get to all Districts at that time, but we try and get an Officer to each one. Presenting Anniversary Scrolls to clubs is an important role we play at those meetings. I plan to visit each District during the administration. I also attend club functions when invited and the schedule allows.

It is a busy job, but I am enjoying it immensely. The great clubwomen of GFWC Illinois make it an honor and a privilege to serve as your 59th President. Don't hesitate to contact me if I can be of help to you in any way.

WHAT A TREASURER NEEDS TO KNOW

Janice Perkins, GFWC IL Treasurer Loretta Revesz, GFWC IL Junior Treasurer

Some of the general duties of the GFWC Illinois Treasurer and GFWC Illinois Junior Treasurer include writing checks and collecting money at events such as state board meetings, Blue Ribbon Fashion Show, Conventions as well as other miscellaneous events where money may be involved. The Treasurer is one of the people who is authorized to sign checks as part of the "two signatures" policy used for all checks.

The GFWC Illinois Treasurer makes deposits into the bank checking account and broker investment accounts. The Junior Treasurer makes deposits into the Junior Organization's checking account.

The GFWC Illinois Treasurer monitors the checking and broker account activity. Monitoring the Broker Account involves knowing the requirements of the individual funds and maintaining balances as needed. The broker account has become more important this year because we are using it as a checking and credit card transaction area also. Due to this, we have been able to lower certain transfer expenses as well as having to work less with the timing of the movement of funds. The Treasurer is responsible to do online fund transfers, after consultation with the President, Diane Addante. Due to the delicate nature of these issues, we are instituting a Finance Committee to help advise the Treasurer in certain areas and to set up appropriate policies and procedures to protect our funding as well as to protect the Treasurer. As of the writing of this article, there has been one meeting to begin work on these issues. The Junior Treasurer is a member of the Finance Committee but does not monitor the Broker Account.

Both Treasurers work with a committee to set a formal budget each year. Another important aspect of this job is to write reports for the Executive Committee, the General Board, and the General Membership. After the books have been closed for the year, the books are audited and the Treasurers meet with the auditors to help answer questions which may arise. Both the Illinois Treasurer and the Junior Treasurer are responsible for the collection of dues.

The GFWC Illinois Treasurer works very closely with the Junior Treasurer. They collaborate on articles, the dues process, and presentations. Both the Illinois Treasurer and the Junior Treasurer are responsible to pay close attention to the money coming into the state and going out. They have the obligation to ensure full financial transparency to the membership.


It really helps to have a decent understanding of on-line banking procedures, some degree of accounting knowledge, and be computer literate.

HOME LIFE COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM

First as State Home Life Chairman, I developed a presentation for the Northern Region Meeting for July 2014. A one page article was prepared for the Meeting booklet which included projects and partnerships information. As Home Life Chairman, I distributed pamphlets/brochures from Partnerships or agencies to District Presidents.

In October, I toured Easter Seals in Joliet and learned the services offered to clients. There was new technology which offered assistance to the clients to aid in their ability to learn to walk with special walkers. Families are allowed to borrow books, DVDs, or learning toys from the library. They also offer daycare there.

Collaborations were encouraged, so together we wrote articles for the GFWC Illinois *Clubwoman* magazine and prepared reports for Board meetings. We have answered questions in person, on the phone and by e-mail

from clubwomen across the state. It was an opportunity to discuss Home Life issues and make new GFWC Illinois friendships.

Are you able to enjoy more monarch butterflies since we have become aware of the need to help them? Some have found that purchasing butterfly weed plants moves the project along faster than planting the seeds. Habitat for Bees have also become a concern in our state.

As your club sets their budget for the year, include the Shawnee National Forest. By the clubs sharing their funds on the Monetary Project Contribution Form, we are able to plant more trees to continue the benefits of the forest in our state. This has been a GFWC Illinois project for over 30 years! Must be mailed by December 31 to count as a 2015 project!

Don't forget to recycle your wine corks. ReCork.org is still looking to recycle real cork into new products. There are many collection sites within the state. Let's see which club can collect the most corks to be recycled.

Have you found a project in your community which needs to be funded? Outline the project with a description of the benefits of completing it as well as how to carry out the project. Each state is able to submit a project to receive funds from GFWC. Include this in January on your Conservation reporting.

25 Points – Project Evaluation-- Degree of Success (specifics of achievements) Permanence of Achievement (Long-term effect on the community), Changed Attitudes and Practices (increased community awareness and impact on community).

"OUR PROMISE...A SAFE PLACE FOR EVERY CHILD"

"Our Promise... A Safe Place for Every Child" is a project that has been in existence for 21 years. GFWC Illinois and Prevent Child Abuse Illinois have shared the same vision to help communities understand and raise awareness of the prevention of child abuse and neglect, while we strive to educate and to ensure a healthy, loving, and nurturing environment for children across Illinois. In 2002, "Our Promise...A Safe Place for Every Child" became the GFWC Illinois State Project.

As State Project Chairman, I feel it is important to provide information and suggestions for programs and projects that will help GFWC Illinois members keep Our Promise as we strive to provide a safe place for every child. It began at the three Regional Summer Seminars. Information was shared about child abuse and prevention.

At the PCA Illinois Conference held in November, GFWC Illinois clubwomen were asked and provided items for 30 raffle baskets and raised \$771 for PCA IL. In addition, I was able to attend sessions at the Conference and learn more about "Caring for Today's Children & Safeguarding Their Tomorrow".

At the Fall State Board meeting, members reflected on a poster with 87 blue ribbons representing the 87 children in Illinois who died because of child abuse during the past year. Members were asked to take a ribbon from the poster and wear it in memory of the children who had died.

At the State Board Meeting in February, GFWC Signature Project Chairman, Mary Jo Murphy, and I led members in the planting of a "Pinwheels for Prevention" pinwheel garden. In addition, PCA Illinois materials were displayed.

The 2015 Blue Ribbon Luncheon and Fashion Show Chairman, Becky Weber, orchestrated a very successful fundraiser in April for Prevent Child Abuse Illinois.

Clubs were encouraged to plant "Pinwheels for Prevention" pinwheel gardens in April. Thirty-one clubs planted or tried to plant pinwheels. A banner was made which listed the clubs who participated. In addition, clubs sent photographs of their gardens which were displayed at the State Convention and on the GFWC Illinois website.

At the State Convention, brochures and posters from PCA Illinois, Save Abandoned Babies Foundation, and DCFS were available for members to take back to their clubs and communities.

The Illinois Walk for Children: Be a Superhero to Every Child was held on June 6 in Springfield to raise monies for Prevent Child Abuse Illinois. The GFWC Illinois team raised \$2,662.

PIERCE'S PARLIAMENTARY POINTERS

Jacquelyn Pierce, GFWC IL Parliamentarian, NAP Registered Parliamentarian

According to Robert's Rules of Order, the Duties of the Parliamentarian include the following:

- The president, knowing in advance the business to come before the assembly, should confer with the parliamentarian before the meetings open, and during recesses, in order to anticipate any problems that may arise and to avoid as much as possible frequent consultation during the meetings.
- There is no set rule for the number of additional functions a parliamentarian may be asked to perform as a permanent appointee, such as teaching classes and the like.
- During a meeting the word of the parliamentarian should be limited to giving advice to the chair, and, when requested, to any other member.
- It is the duty of the parliamentarian as inconspicuously as possible to call the attention of the chair to any error in the proceedings that may affect the substantive rights of any member or may otherwise do harm.

- The parliamentarian should be assigned a seat next to the chair, so as to be convenient for consultation in a low voice.
- After the parliamentarian has expressed an opinion on a point, the chair has the duty to make the final ruling and, in doing so, has the right to follow the advice of the parliamentarian or to disregard it.
- A member of an assembly who acts as its parliamentarian has the same duty as the presiding officer to maintain a position of impartiality, and therefore does not make motions, participate in debate, or vote on any question except in the case of a ballot vote.
- Unlike the presiding officer, the parliamentarian cannot temporarily relinquish his position in order to exercise such rights on a particular motion.
- If a member feels that he cannot properly forgo these rights in order to serve as parliamentar-

SCHOLARSHIPS

My job is to encourage YOU to share one of the Keys of Knowledge to unlocking the future with students in your community. You can share that Key with others by sharing with them opportunity to apply for one of our available scholarships which can be used to expand their knowledge.

DISTRICT Presidents, I ask that you take a few minutes to talk to your CLUB Presidents about scholarships. They are the Key for getting the scholarship forms into the right hands.

<u>Club Presidents do NOT have to be the person</u> who distributes the scholarship forms.

Encourage Club Presidents to ask for a member who is passionate about learning to:

- Take applications to your High School counselors.
- Take applications to the financial aid office at your local Community College or University.

- (A student does not have to be a first year college student to apply for a scholarship.)
- Spread the word about the scholarships to your neighbors, your colleagues, your churches.

Club Presidents DO have to SIGN the application forms. This is one critical step that often hinders the student's application from being processed. I highly recommend the Club Presidents SIGN THE FORMS – BEFORE giving them to your school counselors to give to the students. This will prevent last minute frantic phone calls and missed opportunities for applicants.

It's a shame for scholarships to go unawarded when there are students who need financial help.

Don't carry around the Key that will help open the Door of Knowledge for some student just because you like to hear the jingle . . .

Lighten your heavy purse and share the Scholarship Key with a student in need!

HINSDALE JUNIOR WOMAN'S CLUB CELEBRATES ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL YEAR

The members of the Hinsdale Junior Women's Club recently announced their year-end donation totals: \$18,000 that will be split among 18 local charities (all nominated by members) and \$200,000 to its main beneficiary, Bridge Communities, a local nonprofit that helps homeless families attain self-sufficiency. This continues the Hinsdale chapter's history of success in fundraising and community partnership. When asked how the chapter manages to raise these levels of funds year after year, club president Anna Fiascone says, "It's really a team effort. There's no way we could do it without the commitment and dedication of our members." Benefit co-chair Elizabeth Dziedzic agrees, "The team we assembled this year to work toward this goal was outstanding. We had women from all different walks of life: working women, stay-at-home mothers, attorneys, former marketing experts, creatives. And we tried to leverage their talents in ways that would directly affect and improve our campaign."

Dziedzic goes on to say that the team responsible for this year's benefit (held in February) was composed of 26 women and divided into sub-committees focused on underwriting, auction donations, and marketing, among others.

The underwriting committee focused on targeting local businesses and larger corporations that have connections to their area. Their solicitation package included different levels of sponsorship opportunities, each level coming with increasing perks, leading up to the "Principal Sponsor" level, which included co-branding at the event. The group secured a Principal Sponsor, as well as eight others also at high-level sponsorships, in addition to many others at lower levels.

A second subcommittee secured donations for the live and silent auctions at the event. The team analyzed past auctions to identify top-selling items as well as items that didn't get much interest. The group focused on finding auction packages that were one-of-a-kind experiences, or packages that were sportsthemed. By contrast, items for women's health and beauty, while easy to get, were the least-bid-upon. The live auction included a stay in a villa on the Italian Riviera, a vintage motorcycle, diamond-and-pink-sapphire earrings, a VIP concert tour of the upcoming Maroon 5 concert, and a private dining experience at Chicago's exclusive Girl & The Goat restaurant. The silent auction included more than 200 packages. One of the bigger donations became a raffle prize: a week-long stay in Maui, Hawaii. With tickets at \$100/each and a limit of 200 tickets sold, that raffle alone brought in \$20,000. After the live auction, a paddle raise took place, in which bidders could donate funds directly to the charity.

A third subcommittee worked to build a marketing campaign. Articles in several local publications ran in the months leading up to the event. A full social media marketing campaign was launched, using Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and Pinterest to reach members directly (and members' connections through tagging, etc.). The Facebook reach proved the most successful and the marketing team was able to put together a one-page sell sheet that the underwriting team could use for businesses showing the visibility of members in the organization. Additionally, the marketing team created a video combining elements of the charity as well as teaser clips of what was to come at the event. The marketing team used the video on their ticket-purchasing website (greatergiving.com) and also cross-promoted it on social media. Pinterest was also heavily leveraged as the team geared up for the event, showing pins for clothing and mask ideas, building momentum and excitement for the event.

Other committees within the club worked to raise money for the legacy funds: charities other than the main philanthropy in the area to help leave a legacy for HJWC. Two different committees worked on this project: the Legacy Walks team and the Legacy Repeat Boutique team. The Legacy Walks team encouraged members to volunteer to walk in one of three walks and try to raise \$200 minimum from friends and family as sponsors. Just asking friends and family members to sponsor them in walks, the team of approximately 50 walkers raised nearly \$10,000.

At the same time, the Legacy Repeat Boutique team collected and organized members' gently used items for a huge resale event. The team worked with a local church to use the gymnasium for the sale. Members shopped at a preview night before the sale opened to the public on Friday morning. The team advertised the sale in local papers and through social media. The sale brought in just over \$8,000.

Still to come, the chapter's newest committee, the International Committee, is hosting its own event to help raise additional funds for women in need across the world. A summer party is planned, complete with its own raffle and silent auction. The party is expected to raise an additional several thousand dollars.

"It's an amazing accomplishment and the result of so much hard work," Fiascone says. "But I don't think it would be possible if our members hearts weren't in the right place. Every one of us knows that we're doing this to help people in our world, and especially in our community, who are homeless or who are fighting cancer or who need help getting their children services for special needs. I think that, at the end of the day, when we're fortunate enough to get to attend these events and work to host these things, we all know how blessed we are. That's very motivating."
