

- >Community Service Programs are Arts, Conservation, Education, Home Life, International Outreach, and Public Issues.
- >Advancements are Communications & Identity, Fundraising, Leadership, Legislation, Public Policy, Membership, and Women's History and Resource Center (WHRC).

One of the most significant changes this year will be that ALL FUNDRAIS-ING will be reported under Fundraising even if you have reported the fundraising in another area.

Reporting can be fun! Remember that you are recording the history of your club for the past year. You may be surprised just how much your club has actually done. The first rule is to start working on your reports early- **START NOW**. Six months has already passed and you can get one half of your reporting done ahead if you **START NOW**.

"L".....Leadership relates to and affects every phase of our Federation. Leadership involves a positive attitude, as well as the ability to motivate others. People will accept leadership positions if they are given specific assignments and if they feel they have skills necessary to the position.

"I".....Individuals knowledge of Federation is one of the first steps in the formation of GFWC leaders. To develop Federation knowledge, devise unique ways to inform club members about the different levels of GFWC. Try implementing "Federation Moments" at each meeting and "Federation Tidbits" in each newsletter. KNOW YOUR ORGANIZATION.

"F".....Focus on the knowledge of parliamentary procedures and meeting plans. This area is the one that "scares away" many people from being an Officer or Chairman. Planning is an important part of being a leader. Provide a procedure book with deadlines, responsibilities and ideas to make the job more manageable. Use a standard agenda at all meetings. Presiding is not so scary if there is a standard form to follow while planning the meeting.

"E".....Enthusiasm and a sense of belonging should be encouraged. Remember that being a mentor and an enthusiastic role model is essential to developing continued leadership for our organization at all levels. Encourage positive attitudes, motivation and enthusiasm.

The GFWC Illinois Membership Committee is working on a kit to assist you in your membership efforts. This is scheduled to be completed by December 31. Stay tuned!





ART

Art is the process of deliberately arranging elements in a way to affect the senses or emotions. It encompasses adverse range of human activities, creations, and modes of expression, including music, literature, theater, film, sculpture, and paintings. It allows us to express those unconscious basic instincts that are integral to being human; express our basic human instinct for harmony, balance, and rhythm; experience the mysterious; and express the imagination. It also allows for meaningful direct action on the part of an artist or creator.

Art plays an important part in the lives of GFWC members, as Art helps to instill confidence, provides opportunities, and broadens clubwomen's horizons. Moreover, members are the catalysts in their communities for encouraging and actively promoting all forms of art.

A new project for the arts is the American Mural Project (www.AmericanMuralProject.org). The American Mural Project is a nonprofit organization focused on creating the largest collaborative piece of indoor artwork in the world, a celebration of American ingenuity, productivity, and commitment to work. The piece, when finished, will be a three dimensional—painting 120 feet long and five stories high-so large that a special building is being created for it-made of a wide variety of materials, including honeycomb aluminum panels, fiberglass, ceramic tiles, fabric, marble, and blown glass.

As part of the Conservation Community Service Program, we will first take a look at partnerships for the beautification of communities such as tree plantings, butterfly gardens, or regular vegetable gardens. What are the needs in your community?

Check with local officials to get their approval before starting a project. Use GFWC (www.gfwc.org) tools provided for you to choose projects and programs suitable for your club. For publicity on your projects use signs and articles in area local papers. Please contact me at PO Box 303, Cullom. IL 60929-0303 orinfarm@mchsi.com. I am here to help all clubs in anyway that I can.

- * Pick-up of liter and clean-up projects can be done. Your club can select a stretch of road, street, block or park to pick up liter or clean up river banks and streams in your area.
- *Arbor Day plantings are especially important in local areas for schools and parks. Our reforestation program with Shawnee National Forest is a wonderful way to plant trees in honor or memory of someone.
- *KEEP AMERICA BEAUTIFUL, (www.kab.org), has many ideas and projects including anti-graffiti projects.
- *AUDUBON SOCIETY has many ideas to beautify gardens and parks to attract wildlife.
- *Partner with Garden Clubs or ask a Master Gardener to speak at one of your club's meetings on care and maintenance of planted gardens.
- *Have programs with educators on soil and water issues within the community.
- *Have Park Rangers speak about preservation of National Parks throughout our country.

INTERNATIONAL OUTREACH by Jaclyn Hancock & Sandi Lawson



Our goal is to enable members to become better world citizens through advocacy, education, and action, which will affect change in and for our global communities. Our world communities have major problems. It is distressing to see people suffer. Yet, it is wonderful to see how America reaches out in so many ways. It is true, we GFWC Clubwomen make a difference.

Plan USA is one chance. They give people and communities in the poorest countries tools to help them effect real chance-improving life today and offering children a chance for a better tomorrow. GFWC Clubs can sponsor a child from 48 countries around the world. A club can communicate with its sponsored child, can support the Global Women's Fund; which helps through vocational training and micro-finance programs. A certification of appreciation is given to each club that supports the Global Women's Fund.

Operation Smile International (<u>DMorrison@OperationSmile.org</u>.) provides free cleft lip and cleft palate repair, making a shunned child a normal child, one can even swallow better. Preparing smile bags, smile dolls, children's hospital gowns, blankets and quilts, and armbands for the children undergoing surgery are ways we can help also. A great video is available to show to your clubs.

Heifer Project International (www.Heifer.org) is also so worthwhile. For more than 65 years. Heifer International has provided gifts of livestock and environmentally sound agricultural training to improve the lives of those who struggle daily for reliable sources of food and income.

FLAG ETIQUETTE

Freedom to Display the American Flag Act of 2005 which the President signed into law in July of 2006, prohibits any Condo Association and other Real Estate Management companies from denying unit owners the right to display the American Flag from their individual units. This new law means that even though homeowners may have signed an agreement that restricted modifications to the exterior of their condos or townhouses the display of the American flag is exempt from those rules.



WOMEN IN MILITARY SERVICE FOR AMERICA MEMORIAL FOUNDATION, INC.

Recognize the dedication and patriotism of women who have served in defense of the country by inviting them to speak at club meetings and community forums. Honor local servicewomen, women military leaders, and women veterans. Provide support for these women in the community. Sponsor WIMSA registration drives at the club, district, or state level. Although 2 million women have served, only 15% are registered. (See Resources in the GFWC Manual on line) Encourage the governor, mayor, or city council to proclaim the week preceding Veterans' Day as "Women Veteran Recognition Week." Find and identify women veterans (members and non-members, living or deceased) and send their information to WIMSA with designation that the names were sent by a GFWC club.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

Assist with the cataloging of monuments at national cemeteries. Seek volunteer opportunities through the Department of Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service. Assist with the care of outpatients in Community Care Clinics as well as in Veterans Hospitals. Conduct projects that recognize and honor all veterans. Support and create ways to observe the National Day of Remembrance. Promote the Moment of Remembrance at 3:00 pm on Memorial Day each year. Encourage young veterans to join the Veterans Association.

SUPPORTING MILITARY MEMBERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Collect and send coupons to military families overseas. When received, volunteers onsite sort and distribute. Note that military commissaries will redeem coupons up to six months after they have expired. (Visit http://couponing.about.com/blex.htm) Support Homes For Our Troops, a nonprofit group that builds specially adapted homes for disabled veterans.(www:HomesForOurTroops.org) Support Fisher House, a home that helps family members to be close to loved ones during hospitalization for an illness, disease or injury. (www:FisherHouse.org)

LEGISLATION/PUBLIC POLICY by GERRI ECK

My goal as chairman for the 2010-2012 administration is to help each club and district achieve in acquiring a Legislation Chairman. The Legislation Chairman should fill out the legislation report at the end of the year and possibly schedule programs and speakers for her club. Provide your club and district with a list of Legislators, Representatives, Congressional Persons, or Senators from your area.

Here are a few GFWC Action Plans for Legislation and Public Policy:

- * Invite a national, state or district public policy chairman to a club meeting to discuss GFWC's impressive history of advocacy efforts.
- * Invite an elected official to discuss the importance of input and direction from constituents. Hold a letter writing session after a meeting. Have each member write a short letter, on club stationary, to a legislator stating her stand on an issue chosen by the club and based on GFWC and GFWC Illinois Resolutions. Have addressed envelopes ready to mail those letters.
- * Appoint an interested, informed member to serve as public policy chairman.
- * Become familiar with the public policies of GFWC and GFWC Illinois by reviewing the current Resolutions Book.
- * Devote time at club meetings for discussion on existing resolutions, proposed amendments, current events and news stories of interest.
- * Learn about the functions of all levels of government and elected officials through club programs.


