- Obtained pro-bono legal opinions to interpret longstanding trust agreements that govern the use of funds in these trusts.

de all have a place in history. The closing of my chapter as Indiana's President has guaranteed my place in it, as it has all of yours. Will it be a positive reflection of our time? Only history will be able to answer that question. Since we stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us we need to make sure that foundation will be able to hold up the future generations of women.

I just watched a movie called Cabrini, about an Italian Nun who came to America at the turn of the century. She arrived one year before the establishment of the GFWC. I can only imagine what could have happened if Mother Cabrini and Jane Cunningham Croly got together during the infancy of this great country that so many of us call home. While Mother Cabrini established orphanages and hospitals, all of which were run by women, "Jenny June", the daughter of a Unitarian Minister, immigrated to the U.S. in 1831 from England to start a career in journalism. It was difficult for her to get a job since "women" were not thought to have as much intellectual capacity as men. Jenny broke out of that confining box and opened the eyes of the world by eventually forming the largest women's organization in the world, GFWC. These two women did not sit quietly in their box. They did not conform to what society had built for them. They had to fight against some of the strongest biases of their times. Our lives and our times are so much greater having had these strong, unapologetic women lead the way and set the examples for us all. Why we don't have a movie about the life and times of Jane Cunningham Croly escapes me. It would be a magnificent boost to women everywhere and would make GFWC more of a household name.

I tried to live up to the standards put forth by the previous leaders who modeled and followed Jenny's lead.
